## Tsunami Due for Australia

Hello Duncan: Reading the latest issue of NEXUS, I note that it appears that 2012 is the year of reckoning for the Earth. ## New Light on Olmec Heritage

Dear Duncan: Each issue of your magazine is a must read for me. And as a Black man of Nubian descent, I find that some of your articles have greater relevance than others.

Regarding your article "The Mystery of the Olmec Civilisation" (volume 15, no. 1), I sensed a thematic thread that I too often see from scientists and historians investigating ancient (Black) societies and civilisations, and that is the tendency to dance around an apparent conclusion about the Black presence in antiquity as well as about the progenitor of civilisations and masters of

science. It is easier, for example, to speak definitively on extraterrestrial involvement and at times even ghosts than to admit that melanin-dominant Black people were the ancient Egyptians and Olmecs.

The Olmecs, as the article correctly pointed out, is a name given to them by a cultural group unrelated to them. The Olmecs are Kemtian, Tamareian or Egyptian people with dark skin, fat lips, fat noses, tightly curled hair, broad shoulders—otherwise, melanin dominant. They did not call themselves Rubber People, as the name Olmec signifies. This would be silly. So who were/are they?

As you and your readers know, in the early stages of Earth's formation it was all one continent surrounded by water. This continent was given the name Pangaea by the Greeks, which means "whole Earth".

The first humans to emerge from the evolutionary mix on this planet were melanin-dominant people and they averaged four feet [1.22 metres] in height and were called the Twa People by some historians and Pygmies by people of Caucasian descent. Of course, they had their own name. These people and their ancestors gave birth to what is popularly called the Egyptian civilisation.

## Time Lines and Distortions

Dear Duncan: I can understand time lines as the variable of time between mass in different terrestrial bodies [NEXUS vol. 15, no. 1].

But when it comes to why, it becomes extremely intellectual. It is surprising that all the great minds never assigned mechanics to the function of gravity. Is it because one of the greatest told them that "for every action there is an equal and opposite reaction"?

Check out [www.agspri.com](http://www.agspri.com) and you'll find there is an exception. With this in mind, rotational momentum can be converted into linear momentum. If this happens to the bound-state electrons with their force centre Earth-directed, every atom becomes an independent power unit of gravity. Let's consider that is possible!

To advance this thought, we change the conventional connection of time and space to time and *confined* space—that is, the space between the nucleus and the bound-state electrons of an atom, where, by the electron radius and the electron speed of *c*, Niels Bohr calculated the frequency of an atom.
